1. Support with material for workshops and training - subsidized / sponsored to the chapter, 2. Educational grants for chapter members attending International meetings - the cost for South Africans to go to the USA and Europe as well as conference fees makes such attendance almost impossible, 3 Educational grants for ISPOR International staff / KOL's to attend the annual chapter conference and present sessions, 4 Continued waiver of fees for ISPOR International for Chapter Board members

1. Lack of government engagement - there is deep-seated mistrust between the Department of Health officials and the pharmaceuticals and devices industries. This presents a challenge to engagement as well as to common platforms at meetings. However, authorities have indicated willingness to engage with ISPOR SA going forward, as we have an agenda for the year which supports their guidelines and policy direction.

2 Lack of funder engagement – despite the participation of both Discovery and MMI in the 2017 conference, there remains a similar mistrust between these organisations and the pharmaceutical and devices industries. Currently 50% of the ISPOR SA Chapter board members come from industry and are not seen as "neutral". This adds to the need to include members from other industries to serve as board members

3 Virtually absent student involvement continues. This is for two reasons: very few students studying pharmacoeconomics and related studies, and historically through lack of targeted efforts on the part of ISPOR SA. Several directors now have partnerships with pharmacy schools in the country which we aim to leverage.
