### **Background:**

The Hungarian Health Economics Association (Magyar Egészség-gazdaságtani Társaság – META) was established in 2003. The founders aimed at establishing an independent organization to discuss major health economic and health policy issues at monthly meetings. Since 2003 META have been organizing 8-10 meetings annually. Each 2-hour monthly meeting is dedicated to a particular research, policy or methodological topic, with an advocate (or researcher), an opponent and a moderator. Pricing and reimbursement policy of new health technologies and methodological standards of HTA research have been discussed at several meetings over years. The Hungarian Health Economics Association was accepted as ISPOR Hungary Chapter in December 2006. The Chapter has 113 members.

<b>Policy-Related Activities</b>	ISPOR Hungary Chapter coordinates the revision of the methodological guidelines for conducting economic evaluation of healthcare interventions. The new guidelines may include explicit cost-effectiveness thresholds for Hungary (2 to 3 times of GDP per capita).

<b>Conferences and/or Chapter Meetings</b>	ISPOR Hungary Chapter is about to organize 8 meetings (regular monthly meetings) and one 2 day-national health economic congress with an international plenary session with speakers from other ISPOR Regional Chapters.
<b>Membership Development</b>	From 2013 a new board structure has been introduced. A Vice President of Scientific Affairs, a Vice President of International Affairs and a Chief Secretary will support the President of the chapter. The chapter has also established a Student Unit for graduate, postgraduate and PhD students from January 2013 with a new position of Student President, elected directly by Chapter members.
<b>Other</b>	In 2013, for the third time, the award for the best health economic publications both in Hungarian and in English for the members of ISPOR Hungary Chapter will be announced.
